Headteacher's Comment:

It's important to note that one day of missed school equates to 6.5 hours of lost learning, which can add up quickly over time. The government has clear expectations for school attendance. Parents are legally required to ensure that their child attends school regularly. If a child's attendance falls below the expected level, the school may issue fines. The threshold for fines is generally when attendance falls below 90%, which is considered "persistent absence."

We understand that occasionally children may need to be absent due to illness or exceptional circumstances. However, we encourage all families to ensure their child attends school consistently to maximise their learning opportunities. If you are concerned about your child's attendance, please get in touch with us—we are always here to support you.

We believe that teaching our children the value of good manners and respect is essential in helping them grow into responsible, kind, and thoughtful individuals. These qualities not only make our school a positive and supportive environment but are also vital in shaping their future success, both academically and socially.

Showing respect—whether it's listening carefully, speaking politely, or understanding the feelings of others—helps build strong relationships, fosters a sense of community, and prepares children for life beyond school. In our classrooms, we consistently encourage children to show respect to their peers, teachers, and everyone around them.
